

Antiquing in the Grand Canyon State Where to Uncover Your Next Precious Find

New York has its Chelsea Antique Market where antiques and collectibles enthusiasts, along with the city's top interior designers, wait at 4 a.m., flashlights in hand, as the trucks and station wagons roll in and are unloaded for the weekend flea market. London has the venerable Portobello Road market. And there are those who insist that the Paris fleas, where the antiques often date back to the 17th and 18th centuries, are the dernier cri for vintage clothing, colorful accessories and antique linens.

But why go to the expense of traveling to such far-flung places on your next antiquing adventure when some of the best bargains for antiques and collectibles can be found right in Arizona? Here are a few tips before you head out on your next antique hunt.

- 1) Do your homework. No matter what you collect—whether it is 1950s TV lamps or cowgirl collectibles—it's important to learn as much as you can about the topic. Not only will it be enjoyable to learn about the treasures you covet, but this knowledge will also help you to become a better shopper.
- 2) Understand shopping etiquette. Try to develop a working relationship with a dealer who specializes in your area of interest. Most dealers are hard working, honest and friendly. Once they get to know you, they will keep your interests in mind as their inventory changes.
- 3) Learn to bargain. Although one would not dream of walking into Nordstrom and haggle over the price of a blouse, it is kosher to do a little bargaining when shopping for antiques. Dealers generally factor in about a ten percent margin in their prices, so most are willing to be flexible. Asking "Is this your best price?" is the most polite way to negotiate an amount. Beware of shops where the merchandise does not have price
- 4) Think about your home. Some folks see things they like and purchase them on the spot without considering how they will fit into their home décor. Before you buy any piece—especially one that costs a great deal of money—think about how it will complement your other furnishings.
- 5) Look in unexpected places. I have found some of my finest pieces of Victorian china in the back rooms of shops. Some of the best finds are found in the least-expected places. For example, even if you are not looking for furniture, take a look at some of the antique stores specializing in just furniture. Oftentimes, these stores have small stashes of ephemera or kitchen collectibles tucked away. You may be able to get these and other items at great prices since they are not the dealer's specialty and he is not interested in them.

While some people may opt to stay at home and buy antiques by visiting the computerized auction sites, most dealers and

While you are having fun browsing, please keep in mind the motto of most antique shops across the nation: "Lovely to look at and lovely to hold. But if you break it, it's sold!"



E.T. Paull, the Currier & Ives of Sheet Music



"Don't judge a book by its cover."

Although there is no evidence the phrase was in popular use when Edward Taylor Paull began publishing sheet music with vibrant, chromolithographic covers in the mid-1890s, it is certain that the phrase was an idiom with which he would strongly disagree.

Paull bet a thirty-year career on just how important a cover was to the sale of sheet music.

Popular publication of sheet music in the United States dates to the early 19th century. The first covers were printed

with engraved wooden or metal plates. Generally, early covers consisted of elaborately engraved script with simple or no pictorial images.

After 1800, lithography provided publishers with a less expensive technique for printing illustrated sheet music. By the 1820s, lithography had emerged as the preferred medium. With the introduction of chromolithography (color printing from stone) popularized by Currier & Ives in the 1830s, color covers slowly began to appear.

Printed music had so grown in popularity that by 1857 the term sheet music, referring to a standard 11"x14" size, was

introduced to describe published musical manuscripts. In the years following the Civil War, sheet music publishing grew into a major industry.

Sheet music was the essential connection between composers and the public. If one wanted to hear the latest song, there were few options. Recorded music didn't appear until the 1880s. And radio was in a distant horizon. So it was primarily through sheet music that compositions were communicated.


It just so happens that only a year after the term sheet music had entered the vocabulary, Edward Taylor Paull was born in Gerrardstown, Virginia—the oldest of Henry and Margaret Paull's three children.

We don't know how or why Paull gravitated to the music business, but by 1878 when he was just 20 years old, Paull was managing the J.S. Caroll music store selling organs and pianos in Martensburg, Virginia.

There is some evidence that he went on to become an agent/ travelling salesman for the Estey Organ Company. It is during this time that Paull ran into financial difficulties. By 1885, he had amassed sufficient debt that required his prosperous father's help to pay it off. Shortly after, Paull relocated to the Sanders and Stayman music store in the larger city of Richmond, Virginia.

Paull's first connection to sheet music came in 1888 when, according to an article in the April 1989 The Sheet Music Exchange, his name appears on "Chase Bros. Grand Triumphal March."



However, this store is quite unique because Owners Brice and Carol Willis regularly travel to England and France to purchase the furniture and smalls that dominate the inventory offered at the **Trading Post**.

Local estate items with along local

memorabilia, including Old West Items, are always in stock, and the mall boasts a huge collection of Sun Purple glassware. Customers can also find player pianos, organs, phonographs and radios. Currently, there is a large collection of Native American turquoise and silver jewelry.

Brice was initially a "dealer" in his teen years when he imported antiques from England, and in 1970, the couple purchased a collection of Haviland china and assorted other antiques that they sold through Yesterday House in Flagstaff.



However, raising a family and teaching intervened so owning their own business was put on hold until they created the Trading Post in 1994.



In 1894, after 16 years in the music business with all its upsand-downs, E. T. Paull finally found his stride. The publication of his composition Chariot Race or Ben Hur March—inspired by the enormously popular 1880 Lew Wallace novel Ben Hur: A Tale of the Christ—was an instant success.

It's exciting chromolithographic cover depicting all the energy, tension and excitement of a chariot race was unlike

any other ever seen. Even coming from an unknown composer publisher, and it nonetheless sold 60,000 copies the year alone propelling E. Paull to the top of his industry literally overnight.

When John Phillip Sousa, the March King, recorded the Chariot Race, Paull's career was assured.

While in Richmond, Paull discovered August Hoen's lithography

firm—the ideal company to create vivid covers using as many as five lithographic stones to provide remarkable depth. It was the start of a year's-long relationship.

In 1895 and early 1896, while still in Richmond, Paull published three more songs, all printed by the A. Hoen & Co., before making one final move to the home of Tin Pan Alley—then the music capital of the U.S.—New York City.

The E.T. Paull Music Company went on to publish scores of his own compositions and those of others.

E.T. Paull researcher Bill Edwards says of Paull's music, "Anyone who has played through a large part of the E.T. Paull catalog, particularly pieces written by Paull himself, knows summarily what to expect and when. In other words, it is not necessarily the music that sold the piece, as his writing was both predictable and limited in scope. Many of the sections of his marches are interchangeable..."

E.T. Paull was the Currier & Ives of sheet music publishing. Just as Currier & Ives advanced lithography as a popular, affordable art form, Paull elevated sheet music covers as frameable art.

By the time he died in 1924, three and four-color screenprinting had replaced chromolithography, thus putting an end to an era of a unique printing form dominated for three decades by Edward Taylor Paull.

titles. With variations, the number increases. Some try to collect all the covers, which can vary in price from as little as \$10 to more than \$100 for the scarcest.

Hint: E.T. Paull sheet music covers are so extraordinarily beautiful that they make great, framed art. When displaying chromolithographs and other printed pieces always be careful to avoid exposure to direct or indirect sunlight. Framing behind UV filtering glass is recommended.

Latest American Furniture Book Includes Colonial, Federal Periods

Time is here again for yet another volume of American Furniture. Published annually the books are each considered a classic journal of record in field of furniture made or used in America since the 17th century.

Highlights of the current *American Furniture* edition include Fraktur and furniture of the Pennsylvania Germans from

Millback to Mahantongo and the Nottingham school of furniture in Pennsylvania and Maryland.

There is also a fascinating study of documentary evidence of painted seating furniture during the late Colonial and Federal Periods. Additional there is a fact-filled chapter on Felix Huntington and the furniture Norwich, Connecticut during the period of 1770 to 1800.

Also included in the latest volume are reviews of furniture-related books. Titles



Book Review

"Tramp Art" Gets Its Due In Newly Released Volume

art has sometimes been overlooked Tramp underappreciated over the decades, however it finally gets its due in the just released A Legacy in Tamp Art by Clifford Wallach.

This is a richly illustrated and rewarding read about how untrained artists created striking pieces from generally unwanted and unheralded materials like old cigar boxes and discarded

wooded crates.

Applications of tramp art were vast. There were picture frames, miniature houses, wall cupboards, and even small carousels in exquisite detail. There are lamps, birdcages, wall pockets, and even a miniature roll top desk. Then there are pedestal boxes, sewing boxes, jewelry boxes, glove boxes, sewing boxes, and boxes with no specific use other than their enduring appeal.

Besides everything from a child's dresser to a whimsical

wagon, there are presentations of specific artists. Readers will learn a little about artists such as Augustus "Gus" Wynn, Levi Fisher Ames, Robert Louis Kosmerl, Carl Briston, Ernest Huber and many others who actually crafted and thus created treasured tramp art in the past.

The best part, however, is the generous selection of photographs of tramp art. There are ten black and white photographs and more than 630 full color illustrations. Each includes descriptions and dimensions.

"The more I study tramp art, the more I begin to understand it as an art movement created by untrained artists," notes the author in the book's introduction. "The more I understand how the soothing repetitive carving of the notches helped these men in their lives, the more connected I feel to their art.'

Writer Wallach has two previous books on tramp art including Tramp Art, Another Notch, Folk Art From the Heart and Tramp Art, One Notch at a Time. He and his wife Nancy have dedicated their lives to researching and collecting tramp art. Some of their finds have dated as early as the 1870s.



National Postal Museum Offers Something For Everyone

by Harry Rinker

In Fall 2011, I received a letter from Postmaster General and Titanic." Patrick R. Donahoe appointing me to the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee (CSAC) for a three-year term, beginning January 2012 and ending December 2014. CSAC is a 15-member committee that recommends to the Postmaster General stamp subjects that are contemporary, timely and relevant, while at the same time representative of the cultural diversity that is the United States.

Currently, CSAC meets four times a year in Washington, D.C., a town I visited frequently from the mid-1960s until the end of the 1970s. After 1980, the times I traveled to Washington, D.C. were quick in-and-out business trips. I never set aside time to check out new museums or revisit those with whose collections I already was familiar—or at least thought I was.

Museums are an important source for gaining insight into antiques and collectibles. Ideally, curators have vetted and correctly labeled the displayed objects, thus providing a visual learning base to study collecting categories. In the early 1970s, I once asked an expert how to differentiate between a period and reproduction (exact copy), copycat (stylistic copy), and fake (object deliberately meant to deceive) Fraktur.

His answer was, "Study 500 period examples and you will have no problem identifying the problems."

His advice was on point. Since then, I create opportunities whenever possible to study large groups of related objects, carefully examining them to learn the characteristics that make them period. Even though a museum's objects cannot be handled, at least those on display, they still are capable of providing a creative learning experience.

Washington, D.C., and its surrounds contain a treasure trove of museums. The opportunity to visit these museums was one of the prime reasons I accepted my CSAC appointment. My goal is to spend the day before each CSAC meeting visiting a new or familiar museum. Since CSAC is what brings me to Washington, D.C., it seemed appropriate that I begin with the National Postal Museum. This "Rinker on Collectibles" column is the first of a series of columns over the next three years discussing the museums I visit.

Before visiting an antiques and collectibles flea market, malls, shop or show, I do advanced research. It helps me to develop a visiting plan that maximizes the time I have available. In the past, museum research required going to the public library or local bookstore to see what reference material I could find about the museum. Today, I go to the Internet.

The National Postal Museum's website is www. postalmuseum.si.edu. Like many museum websites, the National Postal Museum's website provides information far beyond information about the museum and its exhibits. The home page toolbar contains links for About the Museum, Exhibits, Collection, Educators, Stamp Collecting, Research, Getting Involved, Activity Zone and Museum Library. After taking a Museum Virtual Tour, I reviewed the current exhibits, making a special note to spend time in the Alphabetilately gallery and at the current exhibit, "Fire & Ice: Hindenburg

The museum website divided the collections into two distinct types. The first is Philately—"objects that chronicle the evolution and history of U.S. stamp design and production; and the administration that controlled their issuance and use." The second is Postal Operations—"Objects that chronicle the development of the U.S. Postal system and the vital role mail plays in our daily lives." Since the website contains far more information than I was going to encounter during my visit, I spent half an hour clicking through the various home pages making "remember to look here when a question arises" metal notes.

Janet Klug, a past president of the American Philatelic Society, is a CSAC member and chair of the New Initiative Committee on the Smithsonian National Postal Museum's Council of Philatelists. When I e-mailed Janet that I was planning to visit the National Postal Museum, she put me in touch with Dr. Cheryl R. Ganz, Chief Curator of Philately, a Hindenburg collector and author, along with Daniel Piazza with help from M. T. Sheahan. of the exhibit catalog for the "Fire & Ice: Hindenburg and Titanic" exhibit. Cheryl agreed to meet me upon my arrival for a personal tour of the collection. Our 45-minute walk through provided me with an excellent overview.

The National Postal Museum is one of the Smithsonian's 19 museums, 16 of which are located in Washington, D.C. The National Postal Museum is located in the old Post Office at the corner of Massachusetts Avenue and 1st Street NE, just across from Union Station. The Smithsonian Institution and the United States Postal Service reached an agreement in 1990 to create the museum. It opened to the public in 1993.

In talking with Cheryl, she referred to the National Postal Museum as a "third day" museum, that is to say, a museum visited during a family or group's third day of sightseeing in Washington, D.C. The Capitol, White House, Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, the Supreme Court, Air and Space Museum, and American History Museum are the stars of day one and day two.

One reason for the National Postal Museum's third day status is a public perception that its primary focus is stamps. The National Postal Museum is far more. There is something for everyone. An aviation buff will be attracted to the exhibits on moving mail by air. The military collector will be fascinated by the exhibit on "Mail Call: History of America's Military Mail," which covers the delivery of mail to soldiers serving on land and sea from the Revolution to Iraq and Afghanistan. Animal lovers will relish in the exhibit "Art of the Stamp: Owney the Postal Dog," which features Bill Bonds' sketches and artwork that led to the creation of the Owney stamp. Owney memorabilia appears throughout. Historians of the development of America can trace the history of the growth of America in the extensive exhibit "Binding the Nation." Police historians will pause at "Postal Inspectors: The Silent Service." As a historian of the History of Technology, I spent a third of my visit studying the changing technology

National Postal Museum, continued from page 34... and techniques that were developed to move the mail more quickly and efficiently.

When I ended my visit, I had a far greater appreciation for the thousands of objects and dozens of sub-collecting categories that comprise the general category of postal collectibles. While I was aware of most, I had not fully appreciated the variety within each sub-collecting category. I also came to realize that I was a closet postal collector. Dozens of objects within my other collections crossed over into the postal collectibles realm.

None of the above is meant to negate the importance of the National Postal Museum's stamp collection. Its stamp collection is one of the finest in the world. William H. Gross, founder of PIMCO and a stamp collector, has donated \$10 million dollars to create a 12,000 square foot gallery devoted exclusively to the museum's philatelic collection.

I have learned from past experience that it is impossible to grasp the full extent of any museum's collection in a single visit. If the visit is to be meaningful and the education received remembered, it is best to concentrate on one aspect of the museum and return later to embrace other learning opportunities. During my advance research, I selected the Alphabetilately exhibit for special attention. Since I am trained to think alphabetically and categorically, it had appeal. It was the perfect test for what I knew, thought I knew, and did not know. My visit confirmed that all three categories applied.

The Alphabetilately exhibit opened on September 26, 2008, and was originally scheduled to close on September 6, 2011. As of mid-April 2012, it still was open to the public. The exhibit begins with A for "Advertising Covers." I was familiar with the

late 19th century and early 20th century material thanks to my contacts with letterhead/billhead collectors. The case introduced me to the wealth of post-1920s material. I first encountered C for "Cinderella Stamp" when viewing a collection of Allentown, PA, Cinderella stamps in David Bausch's collection. A Cinderella stamp is a non-postage printed label that is attached to an envelope. They range from advertising labels to charity seals. Now I know how to properly classify the Christmas Seals in my stamp collection. S is for "Se-Tenent," the term used to describe "two or more adjacent stamps having different designs, denominations or colors." Now I will know what this term means when used during a CSAC meeting.



Top Ten Antiques for 2012

by Mary Dessoie

In the northern and mountain areas of Arizona, our weather is ideal right now for those who like to go antiquing so you will want to get out and about and snap up some investment pieces for your personal collection or resale. Even in Phoenix and Tucson it can be refreshing to explore indoor antique malls, which can be peacefully cool retreats at this time of year.

Here is my annual list of what savvy shoppers will be hunting for at antiques shops, auctions and shows.

- 1. Chinese Republic (1912-1949): Some pieces will be marked "China" or "Made in China." Even the new Chinese middle class has found new respect for the quality of the items from this period. My recent trip to China confirmed that this is a country that must not be ignored. China has a treasure trove of antiques. Smart collectors are able to spot trends before the masses invade the market!
- 2. Americana: All things American are collectible. There is tremendous interest in American country accessories, especially primitive items. Look for maps, quilts, samplers, pottery, crockery, kitchen implements, tools, and nautical items—anything that suggests this country's earlier hard-working roots.
- 3. Modernism (1919-1969): Call it Bauhaus, Art Deco, 1940s Moderne, or Biomorphic Fifties. This was a futuristic and optimistic era.
- 4. Religious Items: There is a trend that explores all religions, from mainstream to tribal. Look mostly for statuary, artwork, but also for ecclesiastical and liturgical items like candlesticks, vases, incense burners and textiles.
- 5. Staffordshire Transferwares: The older it is the better! Scenes are oriental, pastoral and classical. The china comes in an array of colors—cranberry, lavender, mulberry and the everpopular blue. Smart collectors snap up plates in all sizes—from turkey platters to diminutive butter pats.
- 6. Books: Any first edition is sought after, especially American authors. Also look for high-quality gilt and leather

bindings, miniature books, children's books, cookbooks, and books with famous illustrators. Original dust jackets add to the value.

- 7. Artful Metals (1870s-1930s): The rise in the value of precious metals has collectors looking at all metals—bronze, copper, tin, cast and wrought iron, especially when they are artfully crafted.
- 8. Architectural and Garden: Old wrought and cast iron is particularly popular now—fences, gates, pickets, plant stands. Creative decorators are finding new uses for porch columns, garden statuary, jardinières, cement urns, doorknobs, gingerbread, newel posts, barn siding and old furniture.
- 9. Estate Jewelry: Costume jewelry is always a favorite. Also, look for intaglios, cameos and enamels.
- 10. Depression Glass: Now that the craze has quieted down and prices have leveled off, long time and new collectors are returning to this once volatile field. The demand for color has given it a boost. Look for interest to expand beyond the regular patterns and colors to things like Fire King Tulip and Peach Luster and refrigerator dishes.

You are holding the best guide for your antiquing jaunts in your hands. Now is the time to buy while prices are low. So please get out and have fun antiquing!


The Pinball Compendium Is a Real Bell Ringer

Pardon the pun, but the newly published The Pinball Compendium by Michael Shalhoub is a real bell ringer. The

book offers a look at more than 900 pinball machines of the last decade that are dazzlingly colorillustrated with updated values. This is the second edition original volume that has been revised and expanded.

An appealing part of The Pinball Compendium is that each chapter is devoted to a specific year between 1982 and 2011 and features descriptions, release dates and historical



background on pinball machines of that remarkable period. Noted manufacturers also featured include: Gottlieb, Williams, Bally, Data East, Stern, Sega, and still others.

Besides current values, there are stories and interviews with

many of the legendary artists and designers of that historic era. "Readers will gain fascinating insight into planning that went in to the game, how the designers and artists got their start in the industry, behind-the-scenes tales of life in the pinball

world, and other events of intrigue," notes one veteran observer

of the pinball scene.

Michael Shalhoub is the author of four volumes on pinball machines covering those manufactured as early as the 1930s onto the present day. He is also the owner/collector of more than 400 pinball machines. The Australian native notes that times certainly are changing in the pinball world. "Today the majority of pinball machines are no long in arcades, snooker rooms, and corner stores, but rather in people's homes," he comments.


