





## Vintage African Indigo Batiks —The Fabric of Life

When my husband Tray gets home from a "picking" trip, my first question is usually, "What's your favorite find?" Earlier this year, it was Vintage Indigo Batiks from Africa. He couldn't stop gushing about them. And they are beautiful.



I'm a pragmatic person so I love items that have multiple purposes and indigo batiks are so inspirational. Of course, they make great shawls and wraps and are fantastic for throws. Some people like the lighter-weighted textiles for clothing and we like the heavier batiks for the throws. They bring tablescapes to life and make gorgeous tablecloths for all kinds of dishes, especially white ironstone and yellow or red Fiestaware. Many people are using batiks for pillows, and upholstery

Photograph by Julie Shaw bolsters and upholstery work—and it's no wonder because the handwork on vintage indigo batiks is inspiring.

Each batik, like a quilt, tells a story that is handed down from father to son, mother to daughter. Sections of cloth are Continued on page 11...

#### **Nursery Rhyme Rocker**

by Jay Mark

Even as grownups, we find something about children's furniture especially captivating. When well executed, they are delightful, precisely scaled-down versions of their adult counterparts.

They are pieces expressly created to accommodate a child's stature while providing useful lessons in experiencing a grownup's world. Imagine the thrill of a little one rocking right along side mom or dad in

his or her very own chair.

Furniture scaled to a child's proportions dates early in recorded history. A painted Greek vase, c400 B.C.E. depicts a child on a high chair. By the 16th and 17th Centuries, children's furniture appears with some regularity.

Paul Fass writing in the Encyclopedia of Children and Childhood: in History and Society, Volume 2 says, "Children's furniture stresses the social position of the child in relation to both the environment and to adults.

"To have an individual piece of furniture indicates status and the right to a status in the home... The very existence of children's furniture promotes the



child's status in the home...because the furniture is the property of the child and because the furniture physically occupies space – a choice that excludes other furniture and reflects a priority, stressing the child's social importance.

"If a child has a piece of furniture of his or her own, this acknowledges the status and rank of the child. The special form of children's furniture signals that childhood is considered an important period."

The unique feature setting this rocker apart from others is Continued on page 19...

composed of individual motifs such as fish bones, little stars or hunters and each piece has its own unique tale to tell. There are some themes, like wealth and luxury, calabash flowers (a sign of prosperity), brave and fearless, yet meanings differ depending on the individual, ethnic group or region.

African Batik was originally imported in the 19th century by Dutch merchants from Indonesia where paste made from starch or mud is used as a resist instead of wax and the dye is made through a process of grinding indigo plant leaves. African batiks feature larger motifs with thicker lines and more colors than Javanese batik. The complexity of the weave, the color and the type of thread used determines the value of the fabric.

I love looking at the batiks and wondering about the families who made them and what the symbols meant to them. I like to compare the weaves and feel the different textures between my fingers. It's interesting to look at the blues next to each other and wonder how many times each piece was dipped to get it to its perfect shade of indigo. I love that each piece is unique. I love watching customers feel the fabrics between their fingers, throw a batik over their shoulders, wrapping themselves in history. And when someone brings a gorgeous indigo batik up to the register, I wonder what stories will be told about this great, one-of-a-kind find and what memories will become enmeshed with the stories already woven into the fabric.

Simone Gers began her antiquing journey 35 years ago when she married Tray, an avid collector. They still have the first piece they bought together—a pegged farm table that was so decrepit it was behind the antique store—and they have been upcycling vintage finds ever since. The Gers own Gather A Vintage Market in Tucson, AZ, a monthly market. Simone has taught writing and literature at the college level for many years.



#### The Unchanging Seasons of the Human Heart

Often when I'm wearing fingerless gloves or knitted wrist-warmers, the first response I receive is "Oh, texting gloves."

I've texted twice, both times when family in another state had just emerged from surgery. I e-mail—and Alexander Graham Bell's invention continues to work well. Most of the time, more can be achieved or resolved in a short phone conversation than in numerous e-mails. Beyond that, I like hearing peoples' voices and sensing their essences.

I don't begrudge someone's fascination with today's communication methods. They amaze me, too. I rejoice in medical advances and in how social media sites lead people to help each other.

However, I am still happiest when the motion of my fingers is about more than a programmed reaction. If we are blessed with the use of hands and minds, we have precious resources. After all, the brain is the original computer.


Thus, I gravitate to double-pointed needles that look like long toothpicks and work with skinny yarn to make tiny stitches. I use them to make the hand-knit warmth that has covered peoples' wrists for centuries. The men and women, who long ago worked close to windows for light, needed fingerless gloves when the only warmth was a fireplace or sunlight. These gloves were on battlefields to better load a musket or a cannon because, somehow, there has never been

a war to end all wars. If a newspaper was to be printed, the type was once set a letter at a time. Clothing was once sewn entirely by hand since the sewing machine was yet to be invented. The cooper, who made buckets and barrels, needed steady hands—as did the wheelwright, the blacksmith and the miller. As did the spinner, the weaver and any person holding someone vulnerable and treasured. The world was as awash in uncertainty and tenderness as it is now.

At the beginning of the 1800s, the power of steam began to affect how publications were printed, how quickly fabric was woven and how far, fast and by what means people could travel. The turn of time for us today has solidified what we call the information and digital age. Then, too, the people experienced a metamorphosis in how much information they received and ultimately how they used their digits.

I knit stitch upon stitch because the first time I picked up double-pointed needles, I felt a connection to those who had lived before me. For we are very much the same.

We still grow dormant and cold in winter. We harken to spring's rebirth and its ensuing warmth. We hope through summer's emerging crops and flowers and we treasure a successful harvest in autumn. And then we start all over again, just like someone two hundred years or more years ago did. Continued on page 19...

the charming nursery rhyme characters pressed, under steam pressure, into the back employing an embossed metal die.

Stamping was a manufacturing technique that came into popular use in the last quarter of the 19th century. It evolved as an effective way to simulate hand carving, thereby allowing elaborate images to be inexpensively embossed into to a variety of furniture. "Pressed-backs," as they are called, are often found on kitchen chairs, dining, parlor and, of course, children's furniture.

The back of this appealing rocker features a classic Victorian representation of Mother Goose, the Man-in-the-Moon and Itsy Bitsy Spider amid a background of stars—all fanciful images to designed to capture a child's imagination.

The style is typical late Victorian, a form produced between

the 1890s and WW I. The fancy knob-turned spindles and acorn finials provide decorative accents. A dished, slab-seat adds strength and durability against a child's activity. The primary wood is less expensive ash, rather than more costly oak, an indication that the rocker was meant to be affordably priced. Although originally reasonably priced, the chair reinforces the importance of a child in the home.

Regrettably, in the absence of a manufacturer's label, it is virtually impossible to determine the maker of this charming mass-produced piece of furniture. Maybe one day it will show up in an old catalogue.

Originally intended to endure youthful onslaughts, these antiques, now considered too expensive and delicate for a modern youngster's indiscretions, are generally relegated today to display only.

By the nature of their heavy use, antique children's furniture tends to survive poorly. This refinished, all original scarce rocker with its delightful pressed back nursery rhyme theme could sell for more than \$300.

HINT: To refinish or not to refinish is an important question. Although good original condition is always most preferred, late-Victorian furniture with industrially applied finishes in less than perfect condition, can actually see their values appreciate with a sensitive restoration.





#### Salvage Style

#### **Small Coffee Bar**

by Mara Wilson

Coffee and wine bars are very popular right now. I chose to make a small version, so it would fit in most kitchens or dining rooms. I used a small console cabinet, but a chest of drawers or other type of cabinet will work just as well. Old buffets make great bars.

I cut a piece of an old panel door so it would be the appropriate height when attached to the cabinet. An old window would make a good alternative. A scrap piece of lumber serves as the shelf on top and the table legs hold the shelf in place. Paint all parts before assembling. I chose to paint this one a cream color with brown accents. I used stenciling to decorate it, but you could just leave it plain or use some other painting or staining technique.

Use screws to attach the shelf on top of the door piece. Set the door piece on top of the cabinet and secure it with two braces screwed

on the back of the cabinet. Cut the table legs or spindles to fit from the shelf to the top of the cabinet. Screw down through the shelf into the table legs and then up through the top of the cabinet into the table legs. (from inside the cabinet) I attached mug hooks on the under side of the shelf.

Small cabinet Old door



# Phoenix Antiques, Bottles & Collectibles Club Annual Antique Show & Sale, February 26 & 27



#### **Rinker on Collectibles**

### **Antiques, Collectibles & Murder Mysteries**

by Harry Rinker

There is a wealth of titles, new and old, for those individuals who wish to combine antiques and collectibles and a murder mystery. Reading them will introduce the reader to a number of antiques and collectibles' cozy mystery series, their characters and the authors who create them. This column focuses first on new titles and second on older titles, fortunately still in print.

Reading all five of the following books will brighten what's left of your holiday season and well into the New Year. Cozy antiques and collectibles mysteries are gifts that keep on giving—one I am delighted to share with you.

[Author's Aside #1: Each author has her own unique writing style, which is one of the reasons I look forward to each new title as it appears. The characters in these cozy antiques and collectibles mysteries have become family. Yet, they are family members I would avoid visiting in real life. Death has a strange habit of knocking at their doors.]

Jane Cleland's *Ornaments of Death*, published by Minotaur Books, is the tenth cozy mystery in the Josie Prescott Mystery Series. For information about Jane Cleland and the full series, visit www.janecleland.net.

Ian Bennington, a distant English relative who discovered his relationship with Josie while doing family genealogy research on Arabella Churchill, a mistress of King James II, knocks on the door of Prescott's Antiques as Josie and the staff are preparing for the Christmas holiday. Locating and authenticating period miniatures of King James II and Arabella Churchill is the crux of the story. Ian's appearance will be limited to one novel. He is murdered shortly after his initial visit with Josie.

Rocky Point (fictional but real in the minds of the series readers), New Hampshire, is picture-postcard perfect in its winter setting. Seasonal New England is a treasure trove location for writers.

The relationship between the series characters has matured greatly. In most cozy mystery series, the amateur sleuth heroine's relationship with the local police is tenuous. Chief Ellis and several of the officers rely, respect, and encourage Josie's professional expertise. Josie's relationship with Wes, a local reporter, creates an information conduit, albeit it is not clear who is the beneficiary—Josie, Wes or the local police who seem to use the conduit as an off the record pipeline.

As with most cozy mysteries, *Ornaments of Death* is an easy read. Once I start an antiques and collectibles cozy mystery, I often finish it in a single read. This is not to suggest these books are short in length. *Ornaments of Death* is over 200 pages.

White Colander Crime by Victoria Hamilton, a pseudonym for Donna Lea Simpson, is a new title in A Vintage Mystery Series, its fifth. It is published by Berkley Prime Crime, an imprint of Penguin Random House. See: www.victoriahamiltonmysteries.com.

Queensville, a northern Michigan town just across the border from Canada, is the setting for the series. Jayne Leighton, vintage cookware collector and food columnist, is the heroine. She and a group of other volunteers are celebrating the restoration of the Queensville Historic Manor, a polite name for old Dumpe [I love puns] homestead. The grand opening takes place during the Queensville Dickens Days celebration.

Like all cozy antiques and collectibles mystery novels, White Colander Crime is a standalone book—that is to say, you do not have to read the previous novels in the series to enjoy and understand it. However, the cast of character in A Vintage Mystery Series is large and back-story references occur frequently. Hamilton's wide variety of characters with their many foibles and faults lends a real life aspect to the story. While I continue to like Valetta, the postmistress at the Queensville Emporium, I chuckle every time I encounter the volunteers of the Queensville Historic Manor. Having spent more than 15 years as a museum professional, I can attest to Hamilton's ability to capture the mindsets of the individuals involved, a primary reason why I left the field.

Jayne is in her third romance in five novels. Like many of the antiques and collectibles cozy mystery series heroines, one of her early romances was with a member of the local constabulary. This time it is with a rugged, individualist with a young daughter. While children are an element in a number of antiques and collectibles cozy mystery series, they are like boyfriends or husbands—out of sight and out of mind. In this case, the young lady is very much part of the story. Adding a child creates a new twist, something that is also likely happening in Lea Wait's An Antique Print Mystery series.

The annual Christmas offering from Barbara Allan, the pseudonym for the husband and wife team of Barbara and Max Allan Collins, is published as an eBook and available on Amazon. *Antiques St. Nicked* is a novelette in A Trash 'n' Treasure Mystery series. Kensington Publishing Corporation is the publisher. For more information about the full series, see www.barbaraallan.com.


Brandy and her mother Vivian Bourne are the primary characters—characters being the correct terminology to describe them. Much of the story is written in the first person in a conversational style, primarily narrated by Brandy. In this short chapter novella, Vivian is only allowed one of the five chapters.

In Serenity [another pun of sorts], Mississippi, during a downtown Christmas walk, Santa Claus is murdered. Although a novella, enough potential murderers are introduced for the story to have the usual surprise ending. Many of the supporting characters, including Dumpster Dan, from the novel titles are present. Tony, Brandy's boyfriend who just happens to be a police officer, is more fully developed in this story.







eBook files onto my main computer, thus allowing me to read the eBook file sent to me by the Allan's publicist.]

Antiques St. Nicked also includes a chapter from Antiques Fate, the next A Trash 'n' Treasure Mystery scheduled for publication in spring 2016. I look forward to reading it.

Although published in 2014 by Perseverance Press, Lea Wait's *Shadows on a Maine Christmas*, a title in An Antique Print Mystery series, is a worthy addition to the title list. The next title in the series is due in spring 2016. In the interim, Lea is focusing on developing her Mainely Needlepoint Mystery series. Lea's publisher also is the Kensington Publishing Corporation. See: www.leawait.com.

In my 2015 Summer Read "Rinker on Collectibles," I introduced readers to books by Mary Kay Andrews. Eloise "Weezie" Foley and her friend BeBe Loudermilk are the central characters. Andrews offers two holiday titles—*Blue Christmas* (2006) published by Harper Collins and *Christmas Bliss* (2013), published by Saint Martin's Press. The BeBe and Weezie series is set in Savannah; the charm of the city's historic district is captured in exquisite detail. Blue Christmas focuses around a rivalry between local antiques and collectibles shops and other merchants to win the "best decorated shop exterior" annual prize. 

# What Is the Best Thing You Have Owned?



I received an email from Joanna Reeves, subeditor/editor newspaper supplements for APL Media Limited in London, asking if she could email me a few questions regarding my opinions about current and past developments "for collectibles." While loath to do another reporter's work (I prefer the reporter interview me and write his-her own piece—after all, the reporter is the one being paid), I reluctantly agreed. I was momentarily caught off guard after reading the third question, "What is the best thing that you've owned?"

This question is similar to another I am often asked when being interviewed, "If there was a fire, what is the one thing you would save?" If my spouse is sitting next to me during the interview, a quick look at her eyes and body posture sends the message, "You had better say you would take me." As you might suspect, this is not what I would say. My spouse is smart enough to figure out how to get out on her own. I would grab something. The exact object is irrelevant at the moment. My deepest wish is that my spouse does the same. It is better to save two goodies than one.

If Linda was sitting next to me when I was asked what is the best thing I owned, she would expect me to pick her. In all honesty, I would be tempted to do exactly that. Linda is a keeper, and I look forward to a long life with her. The problem is that such a response or attitude is totally unacceptable in this age of political correctness. The concept that one person

"owns" another is an anathema. For better and for worse implies commitment not ownership. As a result, responding "Linda" to the reporter's question is not possible.

When teaching advanced composition at Davenport University, I tell my students that critical reading leads to critical thinking, which results in critical writing. When asked what is the best thing you have owned, the question, being in a past tense, implies what is the best thing you once owned but no longer own. Phrased in the present tense, the question is what is the best thing you own? Is this what the reporter meant to ask? Since the reporter was on deadline (reporters always are on deadline when they contact you), there was no time to ask for clarification.

I accepted the challenge and thought about the best object or objects I once owned, no longer owned and miss. Loss is a difficult concept for collectors. True collectors—those who do not deal to support their collecting habit—are scarce. At the time of purchase, these collectors assume they are going to die owning the object(s).

Occasionally, for one reason or another, the collector reluctantly parts with an object or objects. The decision is painstaking. Regret haunts the collector for eternity. "When it is gone, it is gone" is not an easy concept to accept. Letting go of an object or objects is easier than letting go of the memories. Memories linger.

Until I sold The School (the former Vera Cruz [PA] elementary school), I could count on two hands the number of objects or collections I sold. Unable to fit the objects I had housed in the available 14,000 square feet at The School into a 2,800 square foot house in Michigan, I worked with Kevin Smith of K.D. Auctions in Allentown to dispose of objects I left behind. Two years into the process, the end is in sight.

Needing to answer the reporter's "have ever owned" question, I made a short list of objects that when I think about them, I experience a brief moment of sadness. To my surprise, the objects fell into two categories—objects with great stories and objects I knew would mean more to another than to me.

The first object that came to mind was a wonderful American 1820s-1830s Country Sheraton painted settee that sat in the living room when I lived in a home located on Third Avenue in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, which I rented from the West Side Moravian Church. I love it because of its rock hard seat, one that became excruciating uncomfortable after a person or persons sat on it for longer than 15 to 20 minutes. I made no effort to alleviate the situation by adding a cushion. Its purpose was simple. When guests in whom I have limited interest stopped for a visit, I offered them a seat on the settee. The settee never failed in its mission. Shortly after marrying Connie, my second wife, she found the role played by the settee downright inhospitable. I viewed it as highly functional. Eventually, Connie and I moved from Third Avenue in Bethlehem to a solar-powered home designed and built to our specifications that was located atop Carl's Hill in Zionsville, Pennsylvania. Our solar home did not use solar panels. Instead, it used a passive solar system using building mass, a single wood stove, window quilts, landscaping and location to control the flow of warm and cold air.

German pieces, a few "formal" Victorian items and a contemporary couch. When a decision was made to acquire a coffee table to sit in front of the couch, I was determined to find something of antiques origin rather than purchase a contemporary fantasy Colonial Revival piece. The answer turned out to be a child's funeral pyre, one that was used to support a child's coffin during a home viewing. It was the ideal size. There was legroom underneath. All that was required was a piece of glass cut to fit on top of it. An adult coffin support pyre was too big. A similar devise used to transport the carcass of a pig or cow when butchering was done on a farm was too bulky in appearance.

The coffee table was the perfect conversation piece. When new guests arrived, I could hardly wait for the inevitable tell us about your coffee table question. The reactions ranged from neat to gross. [Author's Aside: The unusual coffee table also housed a medical device—an antique rectal examiner. I reserve the stories associated with questions asked by guests about this for another time.]

In 2000, when I moved to the bachelor pad I created at The School, the coffee table went into storage. It did not fit into the 1950s/1960s turquoise, copper and chrome theme for the living room. What did fit was a "U" shaped turquoise covered kitchen nook set that belonged to my Aunt Doris Bebb. Think corner booth in a 1950s/1960s diner. When Aunt Doris renovated her kitchen in the 1980s, she stored it rather than throwing it out. God Bless the Pennsylvania Germans—they never throw out anything. Although not part of the original plan, it fit perfectly in the area set aside for a 1950s Formica table and chair set. Since it was "built in," I had no choice but to leave it behind when I sold The School. The memories of sitting in the booth at Aunt Doris's house and The School will remain until I die.

The settee, child's coffin pyre, and kitchen nook represent objects with great stories. To end properly, this column needs a something-I-once-owned-that-meant-more-to-someone-else-than-it-did-to-me story.

While there are several such objects on my list, the one that stands out is my Mickey Mantle rookie card. The teeth in my mouth are capped and filled with silver or composite fillings for one primary reason—the bubble gum I chewed with relish when collecting bubble gum cards, known today as sport and non-sport trading cars, in the early 1950s. I kept my bubble gum card treasures in two cigar boxes, far more interested in the Hopalong Cassidy and western card sets than I was in the football and baseball players.

In the late 1980s or early 1990s—I do not remember the exact year—I found something I wanted, remembered a baseball card collector's offer to buy my cards if I ever wanted to sell them and decided to part with the cards in order to acquire the desired object. I was aware the pile included a Mantel rookie card. The collector paid a fair price. Neither of us foresaw the value rise potential of the Mantle card. I was happy. The collector was happy. It was a good deal. To this day, the collector profusely thanks me every time he sees me.

This story always brings a smile to my face. Its importance ranks close to the story about the \$3,000.00 I turned down for the first Hummel Christmas plate in the late 1980s based on the mistaken assumption that if the plate was worth \$3,000.00 then, it would most certainly be worth much more in the future. Dumb is as dumb does is a favorite saying among the Pennsylvania Germans.
